A particularly enjoyable event to me is one in which our whole two-village community comes together yet is able to show the distinctive characteristics of those villages.

The second such event during June was, of course, the Open Gardens Weekend – 'Blooming Bressingham and Fragrant Fersfield'. The superlative financial success, (over £4,000 raised for the restoration of our parish churches and development of the village hall) was so important, but so too was the wonderful community spirit and the participation of so many members of our community, including people newly-arrived here. Everyone involved really does deserve our congratulations and thanks: I know there are other tributes, so I am just going to say a heart-felt 'well-done' to absolutely everyone, and to mention just one person by name – Linda Holly – whose determination and drive really did fuel everyone's motivation – thanks, Linda!

And we move into July ... the Anglia in Bloom judges will be with us on 14 July ... when the wheelbarrows will again be on parade, along with other aspects of our villages. Our recent successes make me feel we have a part to play in this enterprise – complicated as it seems to be – and we may look forward to the outcome!
